² Instead of International Studies/Peace and Conflict Research subsequently the German abbreviation “ISFK” is used.

³ Instead of Modern East Asian Studies subsequently the German abbreviation “MEAS” is used.

⁴ Seminar: An advanced course on a **Master level** that teaches and provides scientific knowledge. Current problems are being discussed by applying scientific methods. Usually, active participation is mandatory and attendance can be restricted. If you only attend, you will gain 3 ECTS. If you take an exam/paper, you will gain 8 ECTS.

⁵ Online: The seminar will be planned as a digital event.

⁶ Blockseminar: A short intensive seminar that takes place in a continuous period of a few days, more rarely for a few weeks. Often, a certain weekday or a half a day as a block time is also offered for several months. Blockseminars may include e.g. laboratory and field exercises, subject-related excursions, post-graduate courses. The examinations are often taken directly at the end of the time block, sometimes they are divided into thematic examination blocks.

⁷ Kolloquium: A seminar where (advanced) students present and discuss their B.A. or M.A. proposals, research questions and/or findings (3 ECTS).

⁸ DE/EN (a): The seminar is held in German, but most of the literature is in English.

⁹ DE/EN (c): The presentations of research materials/data can be in German, English or French.

¹⁰ **DE/EN (b):** *Presentations and discussions are held in either English or German.*

Credit points

At the Faculty of Social Sciences students can achieve: 3 ECTS for attendance and participation (e.g. attendance and presentation) and additional 4 (or 5) ECTS for an exam/paper. Accordingly, you will get a maximum of 7 ECTS credit points for a course on Bachelor level and 8 ECTS for a course on Master level.

It is highly recommended to clarify with the lecturer at the beginning of each course which requirements are needed to accomplish 3 or 7 (8) ECTS. If you do not want to take an exam/paper, you will not get a grade for this class (only a certificate of attendance).
