² Instead of *International Relations/Peace and Conflict Research* subsequently the German abbreviation “**ISFK**” is used.

³ **Seminar:** An advanced course on a **Master level** that provides scientific knowledge discussing current problems by applying scientific methods. Usually, active participation is mandatory and attendance can be restricted. If you only attend, you will gain 3 ECTS. If you take an exam/paper, you will gain **8 ECTS**.

⁵ **Kolloquium:** A seminar where (advanced) students present and discuss their B.A. or M.A. proposals, research questions and/or findings.

Credit points

At the Faculty of Social Sciences students can achieve: **3 ECTS for attendance and participation** (e.g. attendance and presentation) and additional **4 (or 5) ECTS for an exam/paper**. Accordingly, you will get a maximum of **8 ECTS for a course on Master level**.

It is highly recommended to clarify with the lecturer at the beginning of each course which requirements are needed to accomplish 3 ECTS or 8 ECTS. If you do not want to take an exam/paper, you will not get a grade for this class (only a certificate of attendance).
